## PERSONAL STATEMENT:

I was inspired to join the Sierra Club after a screening and discussion of the powerful film "Burned" (coorganized by several Sierra Club members), about the climate change and community impacts of logging for energy production. I realized the importance of film for communities gathering to galvanize change. At the time I had just completed directing my first environmental film, "Searching for the Gold Spot," exploring the high biodiversity and natural regeneration in wildlands after wildfire, and the "Burned" screening and community taught me about powerful venues where community members informed by film can openly discuss critical climate issues, the biodiversity value of forests, and the importance of keeping carbon in our wildlands to mitigate for climate change.

As a wildlife ecologist, I spend thousands of hours getting to know remote wild places. Just a few weeks ago I walked out into one of the forests in California with a few Sierra Club friends and discovered and filmed a Pacific fisher, one of the rarest animals in western forests, in a place where it was previously not known to occur. If elected, I will bring my on-the-ground experience and knowledge to the Sierra Club Board as I advocate for volunteer leaders, including both conservation and outings, and for bold stances on wildlands protection.
